

GUEST SPEAKER: ANDREW HAWKINS - "MARINE FIREFIGHTING"

Andrew Hawkins is the District Chief of Training & Safety for the Safety Harbor Fire Department.

Andrew has been in the fire service for over 25 years in Pinellas County. He worked for Clearwater Fire & Rescue for 21 years and was assigned to stations with water rescue capabilities including jet skis, rescue boats, and fire boats.

During Andrew's time with Clearwater, he had several incidents involving marine firefighting both from land and from a fireboat. Andrew's last 10 years in the fire service, including his time with Safety Harbor has been involved in training members in the fire service including water rescue and marine firefighting.

RECAP OF GUEST SPEAKER Nov. 2nd: GEORGE DAVIS - "CREWING ON THE SQUARE RIGGER - THE BOUNTY"

On Wed., NOV. 2nd, at our SHBC meeting GEORGE DAVIS was our Guest Speaker, who gave a presentation on "CREWING ON THE SQUARE RIGGER - THE BOUNTY".



GEORGE DAVIS started off his Presentation on the BOUNTY by giving us some history on the original **BOUNTY**, which was originally called the Collier "Bethea" in 1784, but was renamed the BOUNTY and was commissioned under **Captain William Bligh** to sail to Tahiti to acquire breadfruit plants to be transported to the Caribbean Islands as food for the Slaves on Plantations.

Fletcher Christian was a good friend, whom Bligh selected to be one of his officers. After wasting 31 days unsuccessfully attempting to round Cape Horn on the Southern tip of South America, with some loss of crew and ship damage plus Bligh's continued desire to circumnavigate the globe, Fletcher

Christian with most of the other disgruntled crew plus several Tahitian natives, commandeered the BOUNTY and eventually landed on Pitcairn Island, where they settled after burning the BOUNTY to the waterline, where it sank just offshore.

Meanwhile, William Bligh and a few loyal crew, were set adrift in a small sailing dinghy and they eventually landed in the **Dutch West Indies**, after sailing over 3,500 miles and much hardship.

In order to recreate these events, the **BOUNTY II** was built in 1960 by MGM for the film "Mutiny on the Bounty" in which Marlon Brando starred. (Mel Gibson played Fletcher Christian and Sir Anthony Hopkins was Captain William Bligh in the film's 1972 version.). The BOUNTY II was larger than the original BOUNTY, to accommodate the film crew, etc. In order to create the authenticity of the original ship, they used hemp lines, which were dipped in tar; knives were serrated to cut lines and they were on long lanyards. There were over 5-1/2 miles of line on the ship.



There were over 10,000 square feet of sails. George provided all of the meeting attendees with copies of the Sail Plan from the BOUNTY II. It included: the Spanker Sail (Club Footed Steering Sail), the Aft Mast (Top Gallant), Main Mast (Royal, Gallant, Top & Course), Foremast (Top Royal, Top Gallant, Topsail & Course - Mainsail) and Staysails (Outer Jib, Flying Jib and Inner Jib). The BOUNTY II had a 13' draft and no keel, so she was very tender.

The original sailmakers had no idea of the Bernoulli Effect, as the wind at the top of the masts could be as much as 100 mph, while on deck it may be only 20 mph. It took ½ to 1 hour just to tack or gybe (wearing the ship), during which there were many dangers to the crew. There was a Captain for each mast and no winches, so the crew had to "sweat" the lines off the cleats. During George's presentation we learned some new terms, which we don't see on our Marconi Rig Sloops: Buntlines and Braces.

CNN Founder and competitive sailor Ted Turner (who survived the infamous Fastnet Race off the coast of Ireland, in which many boats foundered and crew



perished), had purchased the BOUNTY II and of course he sailed it. Turner eventually sold it to a group in Fall River, Mass. The last time that the BOUNTY II was in St. Pete was in the spring of 2012.

During the time that GEORGE DAVIS was crew on the BOUNTY II, **Captain Robin Walbridge** was in charge of the ship. In preparation for graduation, each student had to climb the ratlines, while wearing a harness. Despite over a million dollars having been spent on refitting the BOUNTY II, the hull leaked. The crew covered a hole with tarred canvass and 2 crew were on duty 24/7 checking and pumping the bilges. There were very few modern conveniences, such as the 2 John Deere Diesel Engines, which quit. Captain Walbridge actually sailed the BOUNTY II right in to dock her at the St. Pete Pier.

George was on the BOUNTY II when the Navy Captain who would sail **Old Ironsides** for the first time in 100 years came to learn how to sail a square-rigged ship. George served on the Volunteer Sail Training crew for 6 months in 1997. He eventually was Mast Captain on the mizzen (aft) mast.

The sinking of the BOUNTY II occurred during Hurricane "Sandy" in 2012. Captain Robin Walbridge had left NY Harbor to get out of harm's way and sailed east to avoid Hurricane "Sandy". However, they didn't go far enough east and she sank 100 miles off the Coast of North Carolina. Among the 28 crew, all were rescued except one crew member and Captain Robin Walbridge, who went down with his ship.

In Memory of Dale Cuddeback 1933 - 2022



Dale Eugene Cuddeback, 89, sadly passed away on October 30th, 2022.

Dale was born in Manitou, Oklahoma on October 28th, 1933 and he passed away at his home in Clearwater, Florida just 2 days after his 89th Birthday.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth, his brother Harold Cuddeback, his sons Douglas and Gary Cuddeback, as well as numerous

grandchildren, nieces and nephews. He will be deeply missed.

A memorial service was held in his honor at the Veterans Memorial Marina Park at the Safety Harbor City Marina, 110 Veterans Memorial Lane, Safety Harbor, FL 34695 on Tuesday, November 8th at 1:30 p.m. Pastor Douglas Poole, from Cypress Meadows Community Church and who is also a sailor and fellow member of SHBC, officiated the service.

Over 50 friends, relatives and neighbors attended the Memorial and several spoke lovingly of Dale's many kindnesses. He certainly earned his place in Heaven. From his sons Gary and Doug, we learned about Dale's soccer coaching for many years and on how Dale became a sailor. Because he was a very competent Engineer, Dale helped SHBC Members with the electrical wiring systems on their boats; he even rewired this writer's home lamps. Dale was one of the Founding Members of SHBC in 2000. When Dale was SHBC Commodore in 2009-10, he was completely supportive of the Boat Club's inaugural "Bikini Cup" Regatta, which produced 18 entries of women sailors in its second year. Dale filled his boat "Incentive" with "Bikini Cup" female racers, which he coached.

Dale was a special friend. He and I were slip neighbors for many years. We shared many thoughts and we helped each other with many boat projects. He was always there to lend a hand and his expertise was stellar. He talked a lot about his sons and their families and that he was very proud of them. - 02 4: 32 AM partial eclipse
- 03 4:40 the earth's shadow advances
- 04 4:45 AM
- 05 4:49 AM
- 06 5:05AM
- 07 5:10 AM turning red
- 08 Then the high clouds moved in.



By Mikey: I took some Moon eclipse pictures during the May 15, 2022 lunar eclipse. I took pictures with both my cell phone (Samsung S21 Ultra) and my Olympus SP-570UZ digital camera. I wanted to compare how the cell phone camera did compared to the digital camera.

At first, the phone (109 megapixel) did better than the camera (10 megapixel), which is no surprise. However, when the Moon started reddening, like Pix #08 above, the camera did much better, which was also expected. The 2" lens in the camera could gather dramatically more light than the 1/3" lens in the phone.
