

RECAP: JAN. 5TH SHBC MTG. PRESENTATION

We had our SHBC meeting Wednesday Jan. 5th 2021 at the Safety Harbor Library @ 6:30 pm our guest speaker was John Herrick, who presented: "Machu Picchu Adventure"

• **Machu Picchu**, an ancient Inca settlement in **Peru** that is now one of the world's top tourist destinations.

• The name means **"Old Peak" or "Great Peak"** in the native **Quechua language**, "New Peak" is to the East.

• Found in 1902 by Agustin Lizarraga, but he did not tell the world.

• Explored in July 1911 by Hiram Bingham who was directed to the site by local farmers who were farming there for about 300 years.

• The site itself stretches an impressive five miles, with over 3,000 stone steps linking its many different levels.

• It is believed to have been a summer retreat for Inca leaders, whose civilization was virtually wiped out by Spanish invaders in the 16th century.

• Lima, the capitol of Peru, currently has the only International Airport in Peru.

• A new International Airport is being constructed near Cusco avoiding Lima. The \$640m project, which will mainly cater to tourists visiting the former Inca capital of Machu Picchu, is being built by a consortium that includes Hyundai E&C of Korea, Sinohydro of China, Mexico's Ingenieros Civiles Asociados, and Peru's HV Contatistas,

• If you are flying, you currently most likely will have to leave out of Miami and fly to Lima.

• You will need your passport, your Covid results, and a Peruvian Declaration. .

• A cell phone is recommended.

- Leaving Tampa, your boarding pass on your phone will get you to the airside.

 In Miami it is handy to have your boarding pass on the phone, as well as your Covid test results, and your Peruvian Declaration.

• In Lima, many restaurants do not offer paper menus (Covid), you have to scan their QR code on the table to get their menu.

• When we arrived they bused us directly to our hotel for the night as it was midnight on Oct 3, 2021. They have very nice hotels, ours had a restaurant downstairs.

- September is their wet month in Lima, lots of clouds.
- Lima is a city of almost 10 million people.
- It has an old area where we visited a Square with churches and official buildings.

• At the square there are men dressed in yellow who exchange American dollars to the Peruvian Sol at a better rate than you can get anywhere else.

• The geographical size and the different climates of the Peruvian ecological layers have contributed towards an enormous gastronomic wealth in the development of ancient towns. Peruvian cuisine is rooted in indigenous ingredients and practices, combined with European influences, notably Spanish and Arab, as well as Asian flavors from China and Japan. There are even a few West African influences thrown in, as well. Peru has become an epicenter of fusion cuisine, and is often heralded as the country that is blazing trails into the future of gastronomy.

• Did you know that Lima is known as the Gastronomic Capital of the Americas? The city offers a wide variety of restaurants and inviting sidewalk cafes. Lima has some of the country's most chic and cosmopolitan restaurants, serving haute cuisine in addition to regional favorites. Three Peruvian restaurants made it into the World's 50 Best restaurants and Latin America's top 50 restaurants: Maido, Central and Astrid & Gaston.

• **Cuy:** The prospect of **eating a guinea pig** tends to elicit a squeamish response from those living outside of Peru. However, cuy is commonplace here (particularly in rural communities) as a good source of protein. Many have been surprised by how rich and tender cuy meat actually is when served with hot pepper sauce, the dish is often compared to rabbit.

• Alpaca meat is one of the healthiest and most flavorful meats in the world. The meat is lean, tender, and almost sweet. Alpaca meat is not only rich in proteins but also low in fat & has the lowest level of cholesterol of any meat.

The Khipu Database Project (KDP), begun by Gary Urton, may have already decoded the first word from a quipu-the name of a village, Puruchuco-which Urton believes was represented by a three-number sequence, similar to a ZIP code. If this conjecture is correct, quipus are the only known example of a complex language recorded in a 3-D system • Quipu played a key part in the administration of the **Kingdom of Cusco** and later **Tawantinsuyu**, the empire controlled by the Inca ethnic group, flourishing across the **Andes from c. 1100 to 1532 AD** when the **Spaniards arrived**..

• Some have argued that as the region was subsumed under the Spanish Empire, the quipus were actively destroyed, to be replaced by European writing and numeral systems; but the Spanish response to the quipu is much more complicated than this.

• While certainly some quipu were identified as idolatrous and destroyed, the Spaniards actually promoted the adaptation of the quipu recording system to the needs of the colonial administration; and priests advocated the use of quipus for ecclesiastical purposes. In several modern villages, quipus have continued to be important items for the local community, albeit for ritual rather than practical use. It is unclear as to where and how many intact quipus still exist, as many have been stored away in mausoleums.

12 small structures erected on a circular and rectangular plan was revealed on the outskirts of the **Chachabamba** complex which is the gate house on the river up to Machu Picchu. The researchers suggest that they were the dwellings inhabited by the individuals that operated Chachabamba, although the structures are less ornate in the construction.

What is Magnetic Declination?





Did you know that magnetic compass does not always point to North? Actually, there are only a few locations on Earth where it points exactly to the **True** (geographic) **North**. The direction in which the compass needle will point is known as **Magnetic North**, and the angle between Magnetic North and the True North direction is called **magnetic declination**.

Magnetic declination varies both from place to place, and with the passage of time. As a traveler cruises the east coast of the United States, for example, the

declination varies from 20 degrees west (in Maine) to zero (in Florida), to 10 degrees east (in Texas), meaning a compass adjusted at the beginning of the journey would have a true north error of over 30 degrees if not adjusted for the changing declination. The magnetic declination in a given area will change slowly over time, possibly as much as 2-25 degrees every hundred years or so, depending upon how far from the magnetic poles it is. Complex fluid motion in the outer core of the Earth (the molten metallic region that lies from 2800 to 5000 km below the Earth's surface) causes the magnetic field to change slowly with time. This change is known as secular variation. Because of secular variation, declination values shown on old topographic, marine and aeronautical charts need to be updated if they are to be used without large errors. Unfortunately, the annual change corrections given on most of these maps cannot be applied reliably if the maps are more than a few years old since the secular variation also changes with time in an unpredictable manner.






Negative declination (WEST)

If the compass at your place is pointing **counter-clockwise** with respect to the True North, declination is **negative** or **WEST**

If the compass at your place is pointing **clockwise** with respect to the True North, declination is **positive** or **EAST**



How can we calculate declination at any given place?

One way would be to use declination maps. Unfortunately because of secular variation, declination values are constantly changing. When printed maps were the only way of getting this information, the declination values were somewhat out of date by the time the maps got to the general public.

Another way would be to perform a prediction. This should be based on a world-wide empirical model of the deep flows. A web page operated by the National Geophysical Data Center (NDGC) offers a pretty good value for declination. The model reflects a highly predictable rate of change, and will usually be more accurate than a map, and almost never less accurate.

The best way, however, is to use the web site, which offers in a graphical format using Google Maps API the computed declination for any place on Earth. The algorithm implements the <u>World</u> <u>Magnetic Model</u> **WMM2020**.



Henry Bradley Plant (1819-1899) "THE KING OF FLORIDA"

Ellen Henderson and I took a step back in time to discover the Tampa Bay Hotel. Built in 1891 by Henry B. Plant and part of the University of Tampa, it is a National Historic Landmark. It is best known for the outstanding architecture, in the style of a Moorish palace with minarets. A section of this famous Victorian structure is a museum where the hotel's original ambiance has been carefully preserved to evoke the lifestyle of the late 19th century.

The museum accurately reflects the opulence of turn-of-the-century America and the vision of American transportation pioneer, Henry B. Plant. Built


along the Hillsborough, this resort afforded hotel guests the opportunity to participate in many water activities including boating, fishing, and swimming. Many famous people visited, notably, Thomas Edison who enjoyed traveling the river in the electric boat he invented. Another was Colonel Theodore Roosevelt of the Rough Riders, when the Hotel operated as headquarters for the U.S. Army during the Spanish American War.

Upon visiting the museum, you will experience exhibits like these and changing ones such as the current Gasparilla Pirate Festival presentation. During the Holiday Season the museum is decorated for a not to be missed Victorian Christmas Stroll. Ellen, our event chair, is planning this outing for December. Stay tuned.




