They owned a wooden 27-foot sailboat, a 22-foot catamaran, 27-foot Grampian, 30-foot Catalina, 45-foot Irwin with a center cockpit. They cruised down NY Harbor to Florida and on a different trip they Cruised up Long Island Sound to Maine. They lived on their Irwin for ten years, while cruising from Connecticut to the Keys, Marsh Harbor, Bahamas.

ELLIE's athletic endeavors include: Skiing, sailing/cruising/ racing sailboats, swimming, yoga and golf. Her hobbies are: board games, Mahjongg and reading.

They have a daughter, Veronica, who lives in Norwalk, Ct. with her husband and two grandchildren. No pets now, they previously owned two poodles.

WELCOME NEW MEMBER: KATHY BLEDSOE

Kathy Bledsoe was born at Great Lakes Naval Hospital, just north of Chicago, IL. Her father completed his Navy service about six months later, and moved their family back to his home state of Ohio. Her mother was from Indianapolis, Indiana. Three years later, mid-1957, her dad moved the family to Miami, FL, to begin his career as an Electrical Engineer.

Kathy grew up in Miami, graduated from high school early, and spent her first year of college in Fredericksburg, VA. She acquired more college at FSU in Tallahassee, FL, then finished up at FIU in Miami, FL in the Mathematical Sciences Dept. studying Computer Science. At that time, there was no computer science degree available at FIU, so mathematical sciences it was. She did some post-grad work with a professor in Discrete Mathematics, who, at that time, was creating the mathematical model for the buoys that now create the wave direction/wave height for most of the mapping done with NOAA buoys.

Kathy worked as a computer professional for many years in Miami-Dade and Broward Counties, starting as a Programmer, then trained in Telecommunications, then Systems, then Network Engineering. She was self-employed for a decade, helped implement the original point-of-sale system for Burger King Corporation. She was employed at various firms in the Miami area,

including Ryder Systems, and the US government (it was USIA, now the US State Dept.) moving the Office of Cuba Broadcasting/Radio-TV Marti' from Washington, DC, to Miami, implementing a new computer network for the agency in Miami, 1997-1998, and supporting 250 users.

Kathy was informed in 2001, after an injury in 1999, subsequent misdiagnosis, then finally repair, that she would never be able to do that work again. For too long, she could not stand or sit for more than about five minutes. Five years later she realized that was not true for her, however, by then, she had also realized that although she was really good at being a computer professional, she did not really like it.

Kathy became an apprentice in a hands-on touch, energetic form of healing and slow movement work, that she discovered on her own path to healing, beyond the bounds of 'the modern medical model,' which technically saved her life, then left her on her own. She stood for her certification in 2009. She also went to Educating Hands School of Massage in Miami, FL, graduating in early 2006, as a means of learning more about the human body, as well as to support herself as she continued her apprenticeship.

Kathy's father taught her to sail at about age 5 on Biscayne Bay, in a 16' day-sailor designed by Dooley Glander in the Upper FL Keys. She took the pram summer sailing course at Coconut Grove Sailing Club. She sailed whenever she could, typically with friends, and on OPBs. She raced with her dad until she grew tired as a teen of his intense desire towards 'perfection.' It wasn't much fun, so she stopped. She raced in her 30's and 40's, in various races including the



Columbus Day Regatta (until it became too rowdy for her) and the Miami-Key Largo Race. She last raced the Miami-KL race in 1997 or 1998, and has not raced since, though she's willing if a captain doesn't morph into a perfectionist, which she's not.

Most of Kathy's offshore sailing was on a Morgan 4.1.6 ketch rig, built for comfort and was a great boat for FL and the Bahamas and a Kadey-Krogen 38' sailboat, cutter rigged, shoal keel, draft of 3' to almost 7' with a centerboard, which was her favorite monohull sailboat to date, capable of blue-water as well as near-shore. It was just over 12' beam, built for cruising and comfort. She spent weeks at a time over six years doing a lot of sailing through

the Abaco Islands, the Exuma Islands, Bimini, Cat, and the Berry Islands, some further south, as well as some around the Dominican Republic.

Kathy's last 'ex' is a professional yacht captain, who began as a sailing captain, then got into

power vessels, acquiring a 100-ton license and various trainings. Kathy helped him with deliveries and other gigs, learned a lot about power boats, from 50-80' vessels, some sportfish, some go-fast, some built for cruising. If one needs to get from point A to point B fast, power is the way to go, however, she prefers to sail.

Kathy owned a 1966 Columbia 22' sailboat, that she purchased in horrid condition, then restored and named "Joe's Garage". She got to sail her for about



a year. After being told she'd never be able to sail again, and believing it at that time, she gave her boat to her ex, knowing that a boat, that is not used goes downhill rapidly in FL. Not one of her better decisions in hindsight.

Kathy has been athletic all of her life, preferring to 'be outdoors' more than not. She was involved in track and field as a kid, then in high school spent a year on the swim team. That year, having to swim in very cold water in the colder months, was enough of the swim team for her. In college she played volleyball frequently, then racket ball. She has made it through rehab from various physical injuries regardless of being told several times that she'd never do this or that, again, because she trusts the body to heal, given what it needs, even if it takes years, and she doesn't hold still, much, which has been a blessing.

Kathy currently has no pets, although she grew up with a poodle and most recently had a Chesapeake Bay Retriever(mostly)/lab mix and a Border Collie/German Shepard mix. She loves animals, generally.

Kathy left Miami in 2006, spent a few years in Ft. Myers, then moved to Pinellas County the end of 2011. She had grandparents that retired to Dunedin from Ohio and built a home in 1960. Her grandmother lived to be 97, died in Dunedin in 1994, so she has spent a lot of time over a lot of years in this area. She loved growing up in Miami at the time when she did. It was truly a great place then to grow up, loved living there, and, she was happy to leave when she did. The density of population, and the destruction of many of the things she loved growing up there, made it easier to leave than to stay. This area is home now and she's really enjoying living here and happy to have discovered the Safety Harbor Boat Club.

BRIAN GARRY'S DEPLOYMENT ABOARD USCGC-WILLIAM TRUMP-1111

Deployment back on 27 March - 12 April, 2022.

I rec'd TDY/TAD orders, from the USCGC-WILLIAMTRUMP-1111, to fly to **USCG-STA-KEY WEST**, **FL**, to be a CA1, (Culinary Assist 1), for a 15-day deployment into the **Florida Straits**, and **Bahama Channel**. My other CS2 **Shipmate** was **Jordan Dermond**, from USCG-STA-New Smyrna Beach, Fl. Our mission was to serve the **25-man crew**, **three hearty meals**, as well as any **illegal Migrants**, **and/or Drug smugglers** apprehended off-shore.

Our first week was a serious 'Rodeo Ride' for 50+ hrs., with **14-16' seas**, beating the living daylights out of our crew. As a **Fast Response Cutter**, the 'TRUMPS' **Mission** was clearly a **transfer shuttle service**, from **larger Cutters**, **back to Cuba**, for repatriation of illegals, and/or to Trumbo Point for prosecution. At one juncture, we encountered a **45' wooden Sailing freighter**, from **Hatti**, with **88 migrants** aboard. **Mostly women**, **and young children**, and a male crew. Tight Qtrs., ensued, as these folks were detained, outside the Ship's skin, atop our rear deck, under a canopy. Basically, **standing room only**. Our job, was to **feed them twice a day**. **Cooked Rice**, **and Black Beans**, **in the AM. Again**, **in the PM**., plus unlimited H2O.

Another capture, placed **15 illegal Cuban's aboard**, and a fast cruise to **Port Cabanas, Cuba**, for repatriation to Cuban authorities. Not a happy return for those escapees. Again, we on-loaded another 30, atop our aft deck, for a quick cruise to Port Cabanas.

We were non-stop, 24-7, as the trafficking of Human's, is constantly a threat for our Florida borders. Our letter of Accommodation mentioned our Galley Crew, served up **1,125 plated meals**, to both Crew, and Captives while underway. Our days were very long, as the Bell went off at **0500**, and we finished up, with our **final Scullery Duties**, by **1830 to 1900**. Exhausting days, with planning, preparation, cooking, serving, & clean-up. From early am, to evening. Had a couple of days, with **'Fishing Call'**, off the fantail.

A few days, at **Port Call**, for **replenishment & fueling**, found us doing the **'Duval Crawl'**, late into the **'Conch Republic nights'**. Jordan, whom I 'dubbed', Jo-Jo 2, (because of her absolute fast, and furious handling of all Culinary aspects). She was like Two-People, with knowledge, training, exp., and creativity under adverse Seas.

I put a nick in my forehead, after **'Head-Butting' a stainless steal Reefer**, imbedding my Head Cover device, into flesh! Ouch. LTJG Wilson asked: 'Why is your head bleeding, Mr. Garry'? I shrugged it off, saying 'Blood Makes the Grass Grow, Sir". He smiled, and understood. Secondly, after consuming 4 Cups of Java, one early Zero-Dark Thirty Am, my **'Gullet Gasp'**, and spewed a fountain of Folger's, all my ODU's, while I crumbled onto the Mess Deck, trying to save bottles flying out of a Reefer, across the deck. My only second time, ever to become **'Sea Sick'**. Headed down to our Qtrs., jumped into a Shower, fully clothed. Sanitized, tossed on a fresh ODU, scampered back top-side to the Galley, and resumed my daily duties. My Shipmates, giggled & gaffed, and we all Pressed On!.

In calmer seas, week two, I was able to work-out with a couple of Youngster Crewmates, showing them an 'Extended Press', which is 'Old School' fitness exercise. Lying flat on the Deck, extended arms/hands, & legs/feet. You do a Push Up, using only your finger tips, and toe tips. Try It? I actually completed 6, like to kill me. But recovered, an did 5 more. Both of my young Studs, (who are vying to become Safety Swimmers), eventually accomplished the challenging extended press exercise.

Our USCGC-WILLIAMTRUMP-1111, is a 154', FRC, (Fast Response Cutter), capable of rapid OGS, which is Classified. Our much larger 'Cutters', handled to on-loading of large numbers of Migrants, etc. The transfer maneuvers are quite fascinating, & fast. Extreme Safety, Caution, and Care is extended to all illegal Migrants, and/or Traffickers. The USCG, considers all of these **Missions**, as a **'Life Saving Effort'**, at Sea.

A very costly expenditure for our Taxpayers to absorb.

Our Captain, as well as our XO, agreed this evolution was probably the most treacherous Ocean they have encountered in their careers. Those mid-week 50 + hrs., were "Very Sporty', as one of our CPO's, (Chief Petty Officer), lamented.

No serious injuries, 'All Hands', fared well, and TRUMBO POINT never looked so welcoming as we returned to Port, safe & sound.

I salute Jo-Jo 2, and my Shipmates of the USCGC-WILLIAMTRUMP-1111.

SHBC KAYAK TRIP UP MOBLEY BAY

Marc Berger sent this notice out to SHBC: "Come explore the waters around Safety Harbor by Kayak!"

SHBC Kayak Trip Saturday July 2nd: The Kayak Tour included under the Marina Fishing Pier, Safety Harbor Beach, the SH SPA, the Boardwalk Heart Lock fence, Up Mullet Creek 1/2 mile (With a Paddle), then they optioned to Bail Out, or go up past Bishop Creek, to Philippe Park Boat Ramp, Sandbar, and the no name bayou under the Phillipe Footbridge., under the power line tower, past the derelict sailboat, oyster bar and back to the SH Marina. About 2.5 miles - 3 miles.

For those adventurous, we may next leave the Marina and GO SOUTH to Cooper Bayou, Cooper Point, the Hidden Passage and Mangrove Tunnel, under the Golfcart Bridge past the 3 Mangrove islands, Coopers Park kayak launch, ALLIGATOR LAKE Falls, secret kayak launch, and back past the private docks to the SH marina. Another 2-mile 3-hour tour.

Kayakers were instructed to bring HAT, Life Vest, SUNSCREEN, BUG repellent advised, 2 quarts fluid, sunglasses, snacks, whistle if you have one, cameras, bathing suits, rashguards or light t shirts, sailing gloves, life vest, etc.

Kayakers were able to rent **one- or two-person Kayaks** from **Tobago Tours** across from the SH marina. Take a cosmic tour inside the images captured by NASA's Webb telescope By Joel Achenbach and Aaron Steckelberg

July 15 at 6:50 p.m.

NASA's James Webb Space Telescope, the biggest and most powerful space telescope ever built, is now roughly a million miles from Earth, pivoting from one patch of the heavens to the other as it studies the target-rich environment that is our universe. The first handful of images were made public this week.

They're stunning. They're also loaded with information about the universe, the interplay of galaxies and the birth and death of stars.

Still, these images can be enigmatic to the average observer lacking a degree in astrophysics. What exactly are we looking at?

Let's take a closer look.

The Deep Field

There are a lot of galaxies out there. This was the first image made public, demonstrating the power of the telescope to pick up extraordinarily faint, infrared light emitted within the first billion years of the universe. The image is centered on a galaxy cluster more than 4 billion light-years away, meaning its light was emitted roughly when the sun and Earth were formed. The galaxies in the cluster appear as creamy white blobs.

These galaxies collectively create a powerful gravitational warp in space that acts as a lens, magnifying and distorting more distant objects. That results in funhouse-mirror galaxies like the one on the upper right of the image that NASA astronomer Jane Rigby refers to as the Laffy Taffy.
