The ins and outs of replacing your stainless lifelines with synthetic.

Ultra High Molecular Weight Polyethylene, abbreviated UHMWPE and best known by the trade names Dyneema and Spectra, is amazing stuff. Boasting extremely

high strength, low friction, high UV resistance, and ease of splicing, it sounds perfect for many boat applications. Indeed, it is.

I first used Dyneema for shroud tensioners, where compact size and low stretch are vital. Then a low-stretch anchor bridle (it is permanently rigged, so UV resistance was important), then mainsail outhaul tackle

and floating jib leads (low friction reduced effort). I have an adjustable bobstay that would be difficult to fabricate with anything else, since it requires immense strength, ultra-low stretch, low friction to run through a low-friction ring cascade tackle, and UV resistance. There are also places I don't like Dyneema. I tried it for a traveler tackle—it was like jibing against a brick wall. The grip was poor, it didn't take knots well, and it was considerably less cut-resistant than steel cable. Although inviting for DIY projects, there are some ins and outs.

SHBC FEB 4, 2023 CROSS BAY FERRY CRUISE

On Saturday, Feb 4, sixteen hearty & salty souls, boarded the Cross Bay Ferry, at the Vinoy Basin Sea Wall, for a 50-minute cruise across Tampa Bay to the Tampa Convention Center Dock for a fun filled day in YBOR City and the Hillsborough River Walk.

After safely landing, we viewed the all-electric **Duffy Boats**, which we plan on doing a **4 hr. Cruise, April 1st**. Then, it was a

short hop, over to the 40,000-pound all wooden, **electric powered Trolly Car**. Moving briskly along the rails, past the Amalie Arena, the Aquarium, Cruise Liners at Port Ybor, and the Tampa History Museum, we off loaded in **YBOR City at 8th Ave**. near **Centennial Park**. We did a 3-block hike down 7th Ave., to "**Gaspar's Grotto**", for a taste of Tampa's Cuban & Italian Cuisine. Deviled Crabs and Cuban foot longs were among the favored dishes. **Henry**, the resident **Cuban Rooster**, kept us laughing.













Following some local libations, we strolled across 19th street to the Historic "L'Unioni Italiana" Club, late 1894 circa. We were afforded an in-depth tour of the magnificent Architectual design and skilled craftsmanship by early Italian immigrants. Starting in the lower-level Cantina, then the Theatre/Stage level and finally atop, in the gorgeous Ballroom.

From there, it was a jaunt past the hand rolled Cigar store, past "Carmines" Restaurant, over to 8th Ave. and a visit into **Centennial Park**. We then had a look at the early **"Shot Gun" homes**, that housed thousands of Cuban & Italian Cigar factory workers.

Near 1330, we boarded the Trolly and departed at Fort Brooke station in downtown Tampa. We casually walked over to the **2.5-mile Tampa River Walk**. We shared space with Scooters, bicyclist and joggers. We dodged our way Northward, observing from across the Hillsboro River, the late **1800's Historic Plant Hotel**, (now **University of Tampa campus**). We marveled at the **Moorish Minarets**, brick & wooden parapets, that perched above the Hotel, that was **HQ., for Teddy Roosevelt**, and his **"Roughriders"**, as they launched the troops for the **Spanish American War** of **1898**. We viewed the **Row House Landing** for **University of Tampa's collegiate "Skullers"**.

We, split up into smaller groups, like patrols, easing into a **Greek styled Ampitheater**, outside, near the Tampa Art Museum, where we briefly serenaded each other. Crossing Eastward, our PAT, headed up Caas Street, to the restored **1926**, Classic **"FLORIDAN" Hotel**. It's a 21-story first, in the State, with terrific Artisian wrought iron, crown molding, gold leafed, hand painted motif of yesteryear's craftsmanship. It's truly a structure to behold. Marilyn Monroe, Joe DiMaggio, Babe Ruth, Eddie Arnold, Errol Flynn, Marlena Dietrick, to name a few Stars, who bedded there. Marble, Granite, Slate with, to-die-for Chandeliers from Venice, Italy warm the dining & ballrooms.

From there, we did a quick hike down Franklin street, past the fabulous **Tampa Theatre**, with its elevated Organ, Band pit, and velvet covered seats, which showcased the biggest Stars of early 1900 Stage, Silent Film, and Comedic person to person entertainment.

As we progressed South on Franklin, past the "Speak Easy" NY styled nightclub and 2 "Dior" Mediterranean Greek/Lebanese restaurant...we headed West, down to the thatched roofed **"4 Green Fields" IRISH Pub**. 1640, saw the last of our "Mohicans" testing some fine Irish Soda Bread, & pints of Guiness Stout.

As planned, we meandered back along the River walk, to the Convention Center Docks. 1815, saw us boarding the Ferry, along with another 135 or so cruisers, for a run down the Seddon Channel, past the Davis Islands airfield, and Shipping docks at "Hookers Point", for a sunset ride, back to the St. Pete Vinoy Basin. We marveled at the brilliance of the colorful multi-lighting of the Sunshine Skyway Bridge and Beach Drive Marinas and restaurants. Our members were gratified viewing the **new St. Pete Pier structure**, that replaced the old upside-down Pyramid, that previously graced the St. Pete skyline.

Our parking was compliments of the Cross Bay Ferry corp., since we used the "Sundial" Mall garage off of 2nd street. Many surprised SHBC Cruisers applauded our fantastic adventure across Olde Tampa Bay.
