RECAP: MAR. 1st GUEST SPEAKER: GEORGE DAVIS -"ATLANTIC BOTTLENOSE DOLPHINS"

On Wed., MARCH. 1st, our SHBC meeting Guest Speaker was GEORGE DAVIS, who gave a presentation on "ATLANTIC BOTTLENOSE DOLPHINS". The criteria for mammals are that they are air breathers and must have hair behind their eyes. Dolphins are members of the whale kingdom and have DNA that makes them close to the hippopotamus. Females weigh up to 400 lbs., while male dolphins can grow to 450-600 lbs. Dolphins swim up to 35 mph. They need to eat daily up to 20% of their body weight. They swallow their prey whole and digestion takes place in their three stomachs. Their diet consists of fish, blue crabs and sea urchins.

A female calf will stay with its mother for its lifetime. Male dolphins are territorial and may go to another stock to bring up the numbers in their own pod by acquiring other females. When they're tired, dolphins will close one eye and will sleep at the surface for 4-6 hours.




Dolphins are very social and altruistic. During the birthing process, females will form an inner ring around the mother, while males form an outer ring. A dolphin mother will carry her calf on her trumbull until it learns how to breathe. In the nursery pod other females will babysit, while the mother is searching for food. Dolphins will surround fish into a ball and then take turns eating from the ball.



Erin Go Bragh means 'Ireland Forever'. It's actually Éirinn go Brách in Irish but the phrase became anglicised and was already in use as Erin Go Bragh by 1847, the year a group of Irish volunteers, among them U.S. Army deserters, joined the Mexican side in the Mexican—American War. They were known as Los San Patricios, or Saint Patrick's Battalion, and flew as their standard a green flag with a harp on it and the motto 'Erin Go Bragh'.

Fast forward to 1906 when 3 Irishmen went to Athens, Greece, to compete in the Olympics as an Irish team, independent of Britain. They wore distinct uniforms and were there to compete for the first time as representatives of their own country. Once in Athens, however, the Olympic committee decided the Irish must compete under the British

flag. Peter O'Connor won silver medal for the long jump and just as he was about to receive his medal he ran to the flag pole, climbed it, and put up the Erin Go Bragh flag (the Tricolor wasn't officially adopted by the Irish Republic until the Irish War of Independence, 1919-1921). All the other Irish athletes, along with their Irish-American counterparts, managed to fend off security for a wee while and so, for a brief few minutes, an Irish flag was flown at a sporting event for the first time ever!

KAYAK ADVENTURE OUT OF UPPER TAMPA BAY PRESERVE March 7,2023

Another SHBC Kayak Trip was held at the Upper Tampa Bay Preserve, (south of the Race Track gas station on Hillsborough, East of the County line) leaving from the Education Center, where one can rent Canoes, one-man and two-man Tandem Kayaks, complete with paddles, life vests, whistles and maps. Bring your own Food, Drinks, hats towels, and especially Sunscreen and Insect

Repellent.

We left out of the bobsled-like launch at the dock; followed the numbered Day Beacons North up Double Branch Creek (without getting lost in dead ends among the estuary mangroves- a mapping GPS is very helpful) under Hillsborough Road and up the creek almost as far as you want.



Or head South (or do both routes, about 3 hours) past the fishermen, out into the Unmarked channel, past the Sandbars, to Old Tampa Bay, where you can see the City of Tampa, the Courtney Campbell Causeway and even Safety Harbor (which is a LONG way back by Kayak).

Our group of three intrepid paddlers **Marion Ruuge-Aronson, Ellen Henderson** and **Marc Berger** went up the wrong bayou at first; (my bad) then turned around and headed south to the Bay. After going aground in the wrong channel, a brief amphibious landing on a sandbar at the entry of the deep-water motorboat channel, we headed back; saw fishermen, who displayed their just-caught catch of the day; then stopped off at **The Lobster Haven Restaurant** for lunch.



We will do something like this again **April 15**, **preferable out of Dunedin Causeway** if the Red Tide abates. (See separate Article in this issue).
