

Check-in started at 4:30 pm, while the students filled out their **questionnaires**.

Our INSTRUCTORS were **ANDREW HAWKINS and GREG NEWLAND**. ANDREW was our **previous Guest Speaker** in Dec., 2022, when he gave a presentation on "**MARINE FIREFIGHTING**".

Andrew Hawkins is the District Chief of Training & Safety for the Safety Harbor Fire Department.

Andrew has been in the fire service for over 25 years in Pinellas County. He worked for Clearwater Fire & Rescue for 21 years and was assigned to stations with water rescue capabilities including jet skis, rescue boats, and fire boats. During Andrew's time with Clearwater, he had several incidents involving marine firefighting both from land and from a fireboat. Andrew's last 10 years in the fire service, including his time with Safety Harbor, has been involved in training members in the fire service including water rescue and marine firefighting, as well as CPR.

Greg Newland has been employed for 21 years with Clearwater Fire Department and 35 years with Pinellas County Fire & EMS. Greg is a District Chief.

Lecture - "CUBA: The Natural Beauty - Nature Has No Borders"

The United Nations declared 2002 as "The Year of the Mountains." Cuba hosted the conference inviting conservationists from across the Americas and Caribbean region to meet. The coordinator of the UN programs in Cuba invited Clyde Butcher to create a portfolio of the mountainous lands of Cuba; Clyde set out on three week-long expeditions into unfamiliar lands.

This presentation Clyde will discuss his sense of dedication to use his art form, photography to show people that there is a unity between all undisturbed natural places, whether a peak of a mountain range in Cuba, the wetlands where water covers the soil, or a streambed in an urban watershed. Clyde's work is important aesthetically, and it is his hope that it will provide a vital tool for energizing efforts to preserve wilderness and wildlife habitat.

THE EXHIBIT

Commissioned by the United Nations to create a portfolio of the mountainous lands of Cuba, Clyde Butcher set out on three week-long expeditions into unfamiliar lands. He explored the island country's varied geographic regions, from the Sierra Maestra Mountains in Cuba's eastern Granma province, to the southern coast between Manzanillo and Santiago de Cuba. He ventured to places including Baracoa in the northeast, the southern waterfalls of the Serra de San Juan, and the mogotes of the west in the Piña del Rio region (Writer's Note: We sailed to Cuba and visited the Piña del Rio region).

While taking photographs for the Conference for the Sustainable Habitat of the Mountains, Clyde thought about being part of an event changing history for the better, and enthusiastically saw an opportunity to make a positive difference. His photography transcends political boundaries, challenging us to work together to protect natural places across the globe.

"I look forward to returning to Clearwater and sharing my journey through the captivating natural landscapes of Cuba. Join along and experience the presence with my exhibit, Cuba: The Natural Beauty." – Clyde Butcher.

RECAP: SHBC - SATURDAY - 6/3/2023 - THE RACE OF THE DYING WIND

The Skippers and Crew Met at 09:00 (9AM) for a race start at 10:00 (10AM) for the SHBC race on SAT. 6/3/23 the plan was five boats and their respective crew:

"Wanderlust": Skipper: Roof Douglas + Crew: Cam Carlin & Steve

"Pegasus": Skipper: John Viverito + Crew: Matt Gant + Ellen Henderson

"Windstar": Skipper: Mark Kanuck + Crew: Jack Box

"Green Eyed Lady": Skipper: Linda Brandt + Crew: Kim Brennen-Price

"Prana": Skipper: Paul Matthews + Crew: Ron Poirson

Since before the start, the wind direction was from the east, so Co-Race Chair, **John Viverito** decided the course would be a windward start from west --->east toward the Orange Mark approaching Tampa. From there, proceed SW to the White Mark along the Courtney Campbell Causeway and then on to finish line, all with starboard roundings.

The Course was E- (Orange Mark)---> SW to the White Mark and Finish. The pre-race wind was from 85 degrees. The start time as 10:20:00 am. **"Pegasus"** was the Committee boat with **John Viverito** as PRO.

All boats approached the start line on Port Tack, as it was the favored tack and the heading to the Orange Mark was 110 degrees. The first boat over the start line was "Pegasus", followed by "Wanderlust", "Prana", "Windstar" and "Green Eyed Lady". "Wanderlust" pulled ahead of the fleet.



At 10:22 am "Windstar" tacked onto Starboard. "Pegasus's" heading was 126 degrees. By 10:28 am "Pegasus" was gaining on "Wanderlust". At 10:35 am "Prana" tacked onto Starboard. "Pegasus's" heading was between 105-110 degrees (the wind had backed about 15 degrees). At 10:39 am "Pegasus" tacked onto Starboard. At 10:40am "Pegasus" crossed tacks with "Wanderlust", which was still on Port tack. At 10:43 am "Wanderlust" passed "Pegasus" on Starboard tack. At 10:44 am "Windstar" passed "Pegasus" on Starboard tack. At 10:48 am "Wanderlust" tacked onto Starboard. At 10:49 am "Pegasus" tacked back onto Starboard. At 10:50 am "Pegasus" passed "Starwind" towing in "Wanderlust" after Sat Jun 3rd race

RIP: Remembering Charley Morgan — Legendary Sailor, Sailmaker, Yacht Builder and Designer

Charley Morgan was 93, known to all as Charley, passed away, just a few hours after his wife Maurine died.

Charley E. Morgan (1929 - 2023) is a legendary American sailboat racer and designer. He is best known as the founder of Morgan Yacht Corporation.

Most sailors are familiar with the **Morgan Sailboat** made locally in Largo, but its designer and company founder **CHARLEY MORGAN** was an international sailing legend. Many of us have raced in the **Morgan Invasion**, which was originally hosted by the **Treasure Island Tennis and Yacht Club** and later by the **Davis Island YC**. In addition to several Morgan Invasion classes of one-design boats, the Regatta was open to non Morgans, to provide a huge turnout, as many as 200 local racing boats.

Early life

Charley Morgan was born in Chicago November 1929 and raised in Florida. Morgan built the yacht *Brisote* and completed a St. Petersburg, Florida to Havana, Cuba race with Bruce Bidwell. Morgan attended the University of Tampa and took a job with Johnson Sails, located at the Jean Street Shipyard on the Hillsborough River. In 1952 he founded Morgan Racing Sails in Tampa, FL. While making sails Morgan met yacht designer George Luzier, who got him interested in designing boats.

Racing

In 1957, Morgan, along with Charlie Hunt, designed and built *Brisote*, a 31-foot plywood **yawl**. After successfully appealing disqualification due to a lack of engine, he entered the **Havana race** and took second in *Brisote's* division. In 1960 Jack Powell commissioned Morgan to build the 40-foot centerboard fiberglass **yawl** *Paper Tiger*. The "famously successful" *Paper Tiger* won the SORC **Southern Ocean Racing Conference** in 1961 and 1962.

Morgan Yachts

Unable to find a builder to manufacture the *Tiger Cub*, a smaller version of *Paper Tiger*, Morgan founded the Morgan Yacht Corporation in

St. Petersburg, Florida, 1965 after starting his own sail company. Morgan suffered the misfortune of falling ill with tuberculosis, delaying production. Morgan asked Bidwell to join the business, delivering the first yacht in 1965. Early models included the Tiger Cub and fiberglass sloop Morgan 34. The company grossed 1.7 million in 1965.

The company's first model was the Morgan 34 built in fiberglass. This was followed by the Morgan 24, 30, 41, and 45. The Morgan 41 designed by Morgan, his most popular design, became a standard in the sailing charter industry for its strength, simplicity, and space belowdecks. In response to customer feedback while operating Morgan Yacht, Morgan designed the shallow draft Morgan Out Island 41, "the most popular boat over 40 feet overall ever built." First built in 1971 the spacious boat became popular with charter companies, becoming "the standard charter boat." The Out Island 33 was designed and first produced in mid-1971 as part of the Morgan Out Island series.

Morgan's involvement in the company ended in 1972.

Ownership of Morgan Yacht was sold to **Beatrice Foods** in 1968, providing funds for Morgan to design and build the wooden 12-meter yacht *Heritage* to compete for selection as defender of the **America's Cup**. Morgan acted as skipper during the defender selection trials but lost to Intrepid. After Morgan left the company was passed from one corporate entity to another, until it came into

the hands of Catalina Yachts in 1984. Catalina continued manufacturing a few models, including the Out Island 41, before the Morgan name was retired.

Later life

Morgan left Morgan Yachts in 1972. Beatrice Foods sold the company to Catalina Yachts in 1984 and sold a redesigned Morgan Out Island 41 from 1986 to 1993.

Morgan found Heritage Yacht Corporation in 1975, producing trawlers and sailing yachts. The company was forced into bankruptcy and ownership transferred to Catalina Yachts. Heritage Yachts sold the tooling for their line of Morgan Trawlers to Chris-Craft and Morgan began working for Chris-Craft, doing design work on their trawler line.

Morgan later designed the Com-Pac 35 under contract for Hutchins Yachts.
