At 18 Maggie did a **Semester at Sea** with **SEA** (*Sea Education Association*) and learned about the **Maine Maritime Academy** and that there were different avenues to reach her goal of being on the water without having to be a biologist.

In 2005 Maggie enrolled at **Maine Maritime Academy** and worked on the Arctic Schooner "**Bowdoin**". She spent her summers interning on "**Bowdoin**", along with working for **SEA** on the "**Corwith Cramer**". By the time she graduated, Maggie had fallen in love with traditional sail and graduated with an Associate's Degree in **Small Vessel Operations** and a **200-ton Masters License** with a minor in **Traditional Sail**.

Maggie had worked on various boats before realizing there was not any real money to be had and she needed to pay back her college tuition. She started doing research at that time and started working with **Down East Marine Research**. This is where Maggie got to work with the **US Navy** on the "*Tongue of the Ocean*" doing war games and tagging whales.

In 2011 **Maggie** had to get surgery on her shoulder; she met her future ex-husband and had her first daughter in 2012. Since then, she has worked at various jobs in marinas so she could stay near boats, but still be a mom.

Life is full of twists and turns and in 2021 **Maggie** & her brother opened **Maggie's Cafe** on Main Street in Safety Harbor so that she could raise her 5 daughters.

On Fri., July 28 - 48 SHBC Members and Guests from Friendship Force, the Dunedin Windlasses & the Safety Harbor Kiwanis Club joined us for the FREE Boat Tour of Port Tampa Bay.

This event was held aboard the Yacht **Starship 1** at 603 Channelside Dr.., which has 3 decks, is 185' long and was air conditioned on the 1st & 2nd decks for everyone's comfort. The various Guest Speakers broadcasted their presentations from the covered



open-air 3rd deck that had many large fans to keep us cool. The presenters were from: Port Tampa Bay, Gulf Marine, Keep Tampa Bay Beautiful, Friends of Wheedon Island, Freedom Boat Club, EPC, Southwest Florida Water Management District, Tampa Bay Watch, Hillsborough County Environmental Protection Commission, Hillsborough River Coastal Clean UP, Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission, Tampa Bay Estuary Program, etc.

At 8:00 am - those, who were carpooling, met at the free parking lot off Main St. between 8th and 9th avenues (across the street from the Stuffed Mushroom) in Safety Harbor.

8:15 am - the carpools drove to Tampa's Garrison Channel for parking; they used either the parking garage at Tampa Garrison Channel parking, which was at 369 S. 12th St. or opted for closer street parking lot, which was adjacent to the Yacht Starship 1 property. At both locations the parking cost was \$2 per hour (credit card only, NO CASH).

The rest of the group met us at 9:00-9:30 am - where this writer handed out the FREE PASSES for boarding the Yacht Starship 1 - 603 CHANNELSIDE DR. 10:00 am - we departed from Garrison Channel. 12:00 pm - we returned to Garrison Channel.



She has a special cat - a 15-year-old named "Gingerbread".


Jane is looking forward to participating in future SHBC Cruising and Racing plus other Club activities.

Rolex Fastnet Race - July 25, 2023

I was lucky enough to join the team onboard Team Jajo VO65, for this year's 50th edition of the **Rolex Fastnet Race**. The boat was chartered by American, Clarke Murphy, and he was racing with three of his children, creating special family memories together. On the sailing team were a mix of nationalities, all bringing great experience to the team.

The forecast was for storm force winds and an adverse tidal flow

at the start making for some very steep boat breaking waves. The most wind we saw was 39knots of wind, it was rough, wet and a bit cold, but we were very happy on a boat handling the difficult conditions easily.

Sailing a VO65 in these conditions for me was like putting on a familiar pair of comfortable slippers, as if I have never been away.



We sailed upwind all the way to Lands End where we eased sheets and changed sails for a reach north of the traffic separation scheme at the Scilly Isles. From there we sailed upwind on a port tack until we saw the wind shift allowing us to tack and reach into the Fastnet Rock rounding it about 2am Monday morning. From the Rock we sailed in rain and thick cloud with limited visibility but good pressure all the way to Cherbourg and the finish line. We averaged 20knots of boat speed for most of this leg, with the wind just forward of the beam, eased sheets and fast sailing. We crossed the finish line in 2 days 8 minutes 33 seconds winning our class IRC SZ and finishing 2nd place overall

Out of the 430 boats that started the race, there were 15 boats DNS, over 100 boats retired and 28 incidents involving the rescue services including one boat sinking and four boats dismasting.

The 50th edition of the race will be one to remember and I am delighted to have enjoyed such a great race, onboard the perfect boat for the conditions and with a lovely team.
