Email Safety, Yours and Ours

I mention this at irregular intervals, but emails are a good way to get virus or spam mail into your machine. The mail services cannot trap everything.

When one person sends to a long list of recipients using **CC**, it opens up EVERYONE in the list to the risk of infection. How? I thought you would never ask...

One person in the list receives an email from an unknown source. They are curious about the contents, "Receive popular magazines at a 45% discount." Once they open the email, **that was disguised as a harmless text document**, it executes code that collects all the addresses from the address book on your machine. Those address are sent to a central email spam server in who-knows-where. All this happens in two blinks of the eye.

Or.... It executes code that performs malicious operations on your computer, a.k.a "You got a virus!" One blink.

When you send **BCC** instead of **CC**, the recipient only gets your email address and theirs. They do not receive the entire list (it is blind to each of the other recipients).

I know this sounds cold, but some people are as computer savvy as a box of crayons. Don't put your email list, and eventually everyone's machine including yours, at risk by using **C**arbon **C**opy for your email distributions. Use **B**lind **C**arbon **C**opy instead.

RECAP OF GUEST SPEAKER - JUNE 6TH SHBC MEETING

For our JUNE 6TH SHBC meeting, our guest speaker was Alder Allensworth, who at our recent March meeting, spoke about her "SOLO CIRCUMNAVIGATION AROUND THE FL PENINSULA IN A TINY SAILBOAT". For our June mtg., Alder continued her journey North of Florida in her 12' Bauer "Prevail". Before leaving Jacksonville, Alder gave a presentation there. She then sailed up to St. Simon's Island, where she gave a talk to the Rotary Club, then on to St. Catherine's, which is a private island after crossing



a big body of water. **Alder** was able to use her whisker pole to go wing-on-wing and she surfed along. There was a local High, resulting in very strong winds. She found a small creek, for protection, where there was a no-trespassing sign. After speaking with the land owner, she was able to spend the night to rest up. This area was formerly a plantation, where she saw old slave huts and observed turtles and lemurs. It was originally owned by the man who invented **Life Savers Candy**.

The next segment was **St. Catherine's** to **Savannah**, **GA**, where **Alder** encountered an overhead helicopter from **Mosquito Control**, which dropped a cooler with supplies. It turned out that the pilot, who had done **Sea & Air Rescue** in **Viet Nam**, was a friend of her family's. At **Hell's Gate** she had to go with the tide, where she encountered much rain before arriving at the Isle of Hope, where she obtained free dockage.

Next stop was **Savannah**, **GA** to **Hilton Head SC**. The tide was running at 6 kts in the main shipping channel and **Alder** endured the afternoon storms. She had to go through locks and stayed there two days. They sent an escort out, so she could safely re-enter the Sound. At **Beaufort**, **SC** she heard marsh hens barking and observed shrimping boats coming back in from the Atlantic. They stopped quite near her, causing concern. There was no cell service there, but **Alder** did have her flare kit, just in case. It turned out they were just pulling up their nets before continuing on, so she had nothing to fear.

At **Charleston**, **SC**, where **Alder** learned to sail with her Dad at age 3, it was like a homecoming for her. Next stop was **McClellanville**, which is a very quaint town. While there she borrowed a guy's bicycle to get supplies for the next leg of her journey. From her book **Alder** read a poem about the salt marshes. Next up was **Georgetown** and **Myrtle Beach**, **SC**, which is power boat heaven, sailors had to take special heed. She traversed the **Wacamaw River** then the **Little River** to **Southport**, on to the **Cape Fear River** in **NC** with 20 knot winds, where her bywords were "Don't Look Back".

Now in **Wrightsville Beach**, she carried on to **Topsail** and **Camp LeJune**, where they train for both the **Marines** and the **US Navy**. Unfortunately, their Community Sailing Program had been disbanded. After that disappointment, **Alder** went on to **Swansboro** and **Morehead City, NC**, where she met a guy from the local newspaper, who let her know he had been following her journey via CNN.

Alder was exhausted, and she needed a break, so he suggested she go back to St. Pete for a rest. While back home, Alder decided to start the "Sailability Greater Tampa Bay" Program out of the Clearwater Community Sailing Center. She wrote and got a grant from the Christopher Reeves Foundation, which helped fund the necessary boats for handicapped sailors. This program is still going strong in Clearwater. Alder's Bauer 12' was towed on land back to St. Pete., as Alder had found her new calling.

Alder is now a nurse, working in a local Pinellas County Hospital, on her way to becoming a Hospice Nurse.
