

Don't it Make My Brown Stripe Blue

I'm not sure if anyone remembers the brown boot stripe from *Incentive's* glory days, but *Green Eyed Lady* (*GEL*) just got a paint job. It was cosmetic surgery at its finest! Larry, from Marine Mystic Services (MMS), removed and replaced all the rub molding, too, before painting the boot strip blue. But that's just the latest. *Green Eyed Lady* continues her transformation behind the scenes, as well.



Since my last update, Larry has installed two cabin fans and two solar vents – one for intake and one for outtake. Two are recommended based on the size of the boat. Sal Farina recommended saving the cut-outs after Larry drilled two holes in the deck. He said "They will yield valuable information about boat that you'll need in the future. For example: Overall thickness of deck, thickness of the covering fiberglass, composition of the substrate (balsa, plywood, etc), material (plastic, fiberglass) and thickness of the cabin liner, and any voids in the space between

the cabin line and deck substrate. Making core decisions just got a whole lot easier!

Green Eyed Lady is also the proud owner of a new 9" Garmin chart plotter with Auto Guidance. I purchased the ECHOMAP UHD 94SV from West Marine. Auto Guidance allows you to provide vessel details which will enable Garmin to chart a suggested route based upon the user's desired depth and overhead clearance. MMS is busy building a base to mount the GPS on and needs to install a new transducer, too. It never ceases to amaze me how many balls this juggler has in the air.



Meanwhile, Dale Cuddeback (previous owner of *GEL* and supervisor extraordinaire) provided step-by-step instructions for changing two fuel filters. They are the primary and secondary fuel filters, but they are the big one and little

one to me. The little one was easy enough. I was able to unscrew the part with my hands. The big one proved to be more of a challenge. In fact, several attempts were made before I ordered a new

strap wrench. I did my due diligence when researching strap wrenches and ended up with a 12" Klein that was just what I needed. And I couldn't be prouder of this tool! So, just so you know, there's a new tool in town!





Larry and I have this little joke between us when we're working on something and get easily distracted. It's called "I just saw something shiny!" Well, I did! I ordered Meguiar's Marine Metal Polish for the aluminum plates Larry made to hold the boat's traveler and you cannot believe how shiny they became after applying the polish. You could put your make-up on in that reflection! Larry recommended the product, and it works very well. If he goes to the trouble to do something for you, you better be willing to take care of it or else he will remind you until you do! I get it now, Larry, really I do...

TOUR OF THE SEASIDE SEABIRD SANCTURARY

As a follow-up to our May 5th SHBC Zoom Meeting Presentation on "Everything You Wanted to Know About Seabirds, But Were Afraid to Ask" given by SHBC Member John Herrick, we planned a fun afternoon at the Seaside Seabird Sanctuary and an optional meal at Caddy's Restaurant nearby on Indian Shores on Wed., MAY 19, 2021.



Some of us, Marilyn Mabe and her guest Colleen Baxter and Ellen Henderson met at 1:30 pm at the Parking Lot on SH's Main St. (that's across the street from the Stuffed Mushroom and carpooled together, while the others: Jackie & Joe Mallozzi, Peter Ubillos and Marcus & Debbie Lund drove independently and met us at 2:30 pm at the Seaside Seabird Sanctuary at 18328 Gulf Blvd. (on the West - right side of the Road - facing the Gulf) in Indian Shores.

John Herrick had agreed to be our FREE Tour Guide and we offered to buy his dinner at Caddy's Restaurant, which saved our Club about \$150.00 in group tour fees. A voluntary donation to the Seabird

Sanctuary was recommended. So, The Sanctuary had put out a call for the following items: some donated money, while others brought: bleach, detergent, towels, grapes, apples, and blueberries, which are just a few daily items they use at the Sanctuary.

John started our tour with a background presentation on the history of the original Suncoast Seabird Sanctuary, which was founded by Ralph Heath back in the 70's and changed ownership in 2016 with its new name. He explained how in any given month over 2,600 new birds may arrive for rehabilitation or as permanent residents, among which were: The "Captain & Teneile", "Gracie" (what happened to "George"?), etc. We were able to view the actual Black Skimmers nesting on the Beach behind the Seabird Sanctuary and he explained how they gather near the water line during the day and then closer inland on the Beach at night. These birds are monogamous and take turns guarding their nest and new babies.



Other than buying another electronics gadget for Ham Radio, that pretty much covers my trip. I did run across something you might find interesting...

A co-worker from when I was a worker is into scuba diving and taking pictures for posting on Facebook. I was browsing his work when I ran into his pictures from the Bahamas. It seems he took pictures from the aftermath of Hurricane Dorian in 2019.

The pictures, taken at Great Guana Cay, Bahamas, follow the text I captured from the Wiki site about the hurricane:

"Dorian developed from a tropical wave on August 24 over the Central Atlantic. The storm moved through the Lesser Antilles and became a hurricane north of the Greater Antilles on August 28. Dorian proceeded to undergo rapid intensification over the following days, before reaching its peak as a **Category 5** hurricane **with one-minute sustained winds of 185 mph** (295 km/h) and a minimum central pressure of 910 millibars (26.87 inHg) by September 1. It made landfall in the Bahamas in Elbow Cay, just east of Abaco Island, and again on Grand Bahama several hours later, where it remained nearly stationary for the next day or so.

After weakening considerably, Dorian began moving northwestward on September 3, parallel to the east coast of Florida. Dwindling in strength, the hurricane turned to the northeast the next day and made landfall on Cape Hatteras at Category 2 intensity on September 6. Dorian transitioned into an extratropical cyclone on September 7, before striking first Nova Scotia and then Newfoundland with hurricane-force winds on the next day. The storm finally dissipated near Greenland on September 10."













You do know the FL hurricane season starts this month (June), right?
