



Captain Frederick Braman, USN (ret) was our Club's Guest Speaker in August, 2021 on the topic of: "Cruising the Great Northeast (Florida & Georgia)". Fred previously talked to us in Jan., 2021 on the topic of: "Cruising by Mailboat" and in Oct., 2020 on "Cruising from Jacksonville to the Bahamas". Fred lives in Fleming Island, near Jacksonville, Florida with Louise, his wife of over fifty years. High School Sweethearts, both are originally from Bay City, Michigan. Having lived on three continents, the Bramans have traveled the world, much of it during a quarter century long Navy career. They have called several places in California, Virginia, Yokosuka, Japan and

Naples, Italy home, before landing in Florida. Following Navy retirement in 1994, Fred taught High School Math (including Geometry) for fifteen years in the USA and in Italy. Fred is a graduate of Kettering University with a B.S. degree in Engineering and from the US Naval

Post Graduate School with a M.S. Degree in Management. Fred and Louise have a daughter and two grandchildren.

A lifelong sailor, his sailing adventures led to Fred's writing as he described his cruises along the US East Coast, Cuba, the Caribbean and throughout the Bahamas over several decades. He has published over fifty magazine articles and his first book, "Too Old Not to Go", chronicled his 2012, two-thousand-mile single-handed voyage throughout the main island groups of the Bahamas on his trusty Catalina 30' Sloop "Rhombus".

Fred's presentation included his vast knowledge of these area and he shared his journey on a great circle to from **Daytona Beach North** to **Jekyll Island** via the **ICW**, **Kingsley Plantation**, **Fernandina Beach**, **St. Mary's**, **Kings Bay**, **Cumberland Island**, and **Brunswick**, **Ga**.

While at **Jekyll Island**, **Fred** went to the **Oak Harbor Pub**, N/E off **Sister's Creek**, where you can dock for **FREE** for up to 3 days along the Long Pier. **Jekyll Island** has an **historic district** and there are **Free bicycles** available. The **Kingsley Plantation** was from the late 1800's. The owner had been a big-time land owner. This was along the **Port George River**, which is **not** very busy during the week, but on the weekends is filled with power boats and jet skiers.

Fernandina Beach along the **St. Mary's** is and all-weather entrance. It's 21 miles to the **St. John's River**. Along Florida East Coast ICW, the Red Marks are on the land side (to port as one goes North). There's the **Palace Saloon** and the **Dog Star Tavern**, which were featured in the **1980's Movie "New Adventures of Pippy Longstocking".**

St. Mary's, Ga is along the **St. Mary's River** with an anchorage and dinghy dock & there's plenty of dock space.

Kings Bay has a Submarine Museum, in which the Periscope looks around the town.

Cumberland Island is pristine and there's a **Sea Camp dock** and a **Ranger Station**. There's also the **Dungeness Ruins**, which had been the summer home of **John Carnegie**. There are currently wild horses on the property. **Plum Orchard** is a good anchorage.

At Brunswick, Ga there's FREE BEER.

More Rope, I mean Line

I am not sure if I mentioned the KF7P website, but I know I did not mention the large ½" Polyester rope, where a100' roll is only 62 cents/foot! This source has a rating of 7050 Lbs breaking strength. This is a good size for dock lines, but I would not use it without a snubber because it does not stretch much.

The website is https://www.kf7p.com/KF7P/Dacron Rope.html

This blurb is from their website... "Double Braided Polyester Rope

The engineered design of all of our rope is to maximize strength while providing excellent flexibility and handling while being resistant to harsh outdoor environments. Our rope serves many applications and has special qualifications for use with antennas (wire or otherwise), tower and mast support, hauling, marine, banners, and signs. Other uses include shade sail support, tarping, and archers' bow string follower line. Also perfect for vertical structures such as scaffolding or tree limb control.

High breaking strength: Our ropes are made in USA mills and have the highest breaking strengths available in comparable diameters than our competitors. Why pay for lower strength when you can get comparable rope that is much stronger?

Polyester vs. Dacron[™], what is the difference? Dacron[™] is a registered trademark of the DuPont corporation. Dacron[™] is also double braided polyester rope (just like ours), but due to the trademarked name, it commands a higher selling price. All of our rope is also double braided polyester.

Laughing at the elements: All our rope is resistant to UV light, mildew, rot, and stretch (unlike nylon which does stretch). It also has a very low coefficient of friction (it is somewhat slippery and can glide over tree limbs, etc. without digging in or sawing through.)"

Sailing Vessel with Ham Radio History Marks 100 Years

Sourced by Mikey: The ARRL Letter, Aug 19, 2021

The schooner <u>Bowdoin</u> is a century old this year. Now owned by the Maine Maritime Academy (<u>MMA</u>) as a training vessel, the ham radio history of the 88-foot (LOA) *Bowdoin* is often neglected. Constructed in Maine specifically for Arctic exploration, the vessel relied on amateur radio for communication during explorer Donald B. MacMillan's Arctic Expedition of 1923 and on the MacMillan-McDonald-Byrd Expedition of 1925 --

the MacMillan-McDonald-Byrd Expedition of 1925 -thanks in part to ARRL co-founder Hiram Percy Maxim, W1AW. The venerable vessel, the official vessel of the State of Maine and the <u>flagship</u> of Maine Maritime Academy's Vessel Operations and Technology Program, recently underwent a complete hull restoration and refitting and has done a little touring to mark its centenary. Its home port is Castine, Maine.



The longwave transmitters MacMillan used on his

earlier missions had proved "unable to penetrate the screen of the aurora borealis," ARRL historian Michael Marinaro, WN1M, explained in his article, "Polar Exploration," in the June 2014 issue of *QST*. In 1923, MacMillan turned to ARRL for help in outfitting his next expedition with better wireless gear. Marinaro recounted, "It was enthusiastically provided." Maxim and the ARRL Board recruited Donald H. Mix, 1TS, of Bristol, Connecticut, to accompany the crew as its radio operator.

M.B. West, an ARRL Board member, designed the gear, which was then built by amateurs at his firm, Zenith Electronics. The transmitter operated on the medium-wave bands of 185, 220, and 300 meters, running 100 W to a pair of Western Electric "G" tubes. Earlier exploratory missions had used gear that operated on longwave frequencies. The shipboard station on board the *Bowdoin* was given the call sign WNP -- Wireless North Pole.



"WNP transmitted weekly 500-word press releases and listings of stations worked and heard," Marinaro said. "Once received by amateur stations, these reports were delivered to local affiliated newspapers of the North American Newspaper Alliance; from there, they were distributed syndicate-wide by telegraph."

MacMillan's subsequent attempt at the North Pole centered around wireless. The objectives supported by the Navy and the National Geographic Society were to determine the full capabilities of radio north of the auroral belt and to explore


the northern reaches by air. The outstanding accomplishment of the 1925 expedition was in the sphere of radio. Utilizing shortwaves, the expedition was in consistent contact with the outside world throughout the journey, to the delight of the amateurs who were able to work them. The phenomenal success proved to the Navy that shortwaves were definitely superior to the longwaves and ultra longwaves that fleets had been using.

Somebody apparently wanted the box and did not care about the contents. The lock assembly was not disturbed. They tried to remove the box and caused one corner to separate (the box is made of slotted panels). John and Mark put a cargo strap around it to hold it together. They then bolted corner braces in all 4 corners to reinforce the joints. And that's all I know.

"*Ava Rose's*" (nee Shibumi) Modifications, Repairs and Maintenance.

On July 15 we took "Shibumi" to Viking Boat Works and She returned home on July 27 to Safety Harbor as "Ava Rose".

Ava is our 15 yr. old Granddaughter in New York and an award winning Sailor on the Manhasset Bay Yacht Club Junior Team. Rosemary is our 2 yr. old Granddaughter in Tucson and has yet to see an ocean!

Our crew on both voyages consisted of Nancy, me and Linda Brandt, whose seamanship and "local knowledge" was invaluable to our successful voyages. Apart

from a scrape (literally – VHF antenna) with the Howard Frankland bridge and a strong current alongside Gandy Blvd., it was a very (thankfully!) uneventful cruise!

While at Viking, the boat was thoroughly washed, and the hull

compounded and waxed with the old name removed and the new name applied. The hull was sanded below the waterline to bare gel coat; barrier coated and then treated to three coats of the Petit Trinidad "hard shell" bottom paint. Hopefully, this will frustrate crustaceans for next couple of years!



Additionally, the depth sounder transducer's wooden backing plate was rotted replaced with a fiberglass plate. Since "glass work" was being performed, I had the knot meter removed and the hole glassed over (one less potential intrusion point!). Also, the stuffing box was repacked and the verdigris was removed.

Shibumi was well maintained during her previous ownerships, so she wasn't a "project boat". Nonetheless, she did need a good cleaning and some "sprucing up".

Here are some of the modifications I've made since my ownership (effective January 2021).

The Bimini top was removed, restitched and the bows reconfigured for clearing the boom.

The deck gel coat has a substantial amount of crazing and cracks, so I've begun experimenting with methods and materials to repair them. Once the weather cools down, I'll begin to seriously attack this issue.

Luckily the boat has very little wood to maintain, but I do like the nautical look of some wooden "touches". So, I replaced the "starboard" instrument panel with a varnished mahogany panel and I mounted my inclinometer (from three of my previous boats) onto a mahogany panel and installed it, centerline, on the companionway hatch cover.

A final "touch" for now, was to replace the throttle control knob from a silver skull to a ceramic rose (in keeping with the theme of the name).





Weather or Not, Ambient Weather Rules!

I have had a PWS (Personal Weather Station) for a long time. Over the years, one thing or another has given it up. I finally reached the point where I ordered a new station via Amazon. Not a recommendation, but I chose the Ambient Weather WS-2902C Wi-Fi OSPREY model. This was after sending back two Sainlogic WS0310 Pro units.

Being Wi-Fi capable, It was very easy to broadcast my readings to multiple websites. One is the Ambient Weather data servers. Some PWS units require you to send to their server if you want to send to other weather services. For Ambieent Weather, each sending process is independent of all the others. The two listed below and the ones I use, but you can even send your data direct to NOAA. I did not because they pull from Wunderground anyhow.

Feel free to bookmark my sites (copy-paste the URL), but the farther you are from my house, the less reliable the readings will be compared to your own location. If that makes you unhappy, buy your own PWS and I will help you install it!



SAT. 8/7/21 RACE: ANOTHER LOST MARK & LOTS OF CONFUSION

The eighth SHBC Race of 2021 took place on **Saturday, August 7th**, with the regatta scheduled for a **9:00 am start**. The fleet consisted of *"Empire"* with new owner **Paul Matthews** on the helm and his crew were **Chris Dollin** (who was our **PRO** in place of



Race Chair John Viverito's absence) and Paul's friend Tony. The Rogers 22' "*Playmate's*" Coowner Cam Carlin had Linda Brandt along as crew, as her boat "*Green-Eyed Lady*" was in temporary sick-bay, while "*Starwind*" had owner Commodore Mark Kanuck and crew Quinton Smith and Ellen Henderson.

Before the start, the anchor went missing on the **START/FINISH Line** and one of the Line Marks

disappeared. So, the **Race Commitee Boat "Empire"** had to replace the mark with a fender tied to another anchor. There was an Incoming Tide, which was at its lowest @ 8:45pm, so it was surging in during the entire race. Because of this predicament, the fleet got a bit of a late start at 9:17 am with **"Empire"** leading the way. **"Playmate"** was 2nd over the start line.





However, with the strong incoming tide, both "*Playmate*" and "*Starwind*" drifted down to Leeward and "*Starwind*" caught the anchor line (we were to leaward of "*Playmate*" and we both were on port tack). Once we untangled, we did our 360-degree penalty turn and "*Starwind*" was off and running. By 9:30 am "*Starwind*" passed "*Playmate*" and tacked onto port after experiencing two headers. We didn't know our headings, as "*Starwind*" doesn't have a compass on board. By 9:44 am the wind started picking up from the E-S/E. At 9:58 am a new wind moved in and "*Empire*" tacked onto Port. By 10:10 am there was another header, so, "*Starwind*"

tacked onto Starboard. For some reason, "*Playmate*" was still hugging the north shore near Oldsmar (watch out for oyster beds in those shallow waters).

By 10:20 am "Empire" tacked onto Starboard sailing along the Courtney Campbell Causeway.



At this point the wind was 8-10kts from the S/E. By 10:24am **"Empire"** tacked again onto Port and 2 min. later tacked back onto Starboard. By 10:29 am **"Empire"** passed the **1st Mark (White)** to port. Instead of heading N/E toward the Orange Mark, **"Empire"** took a N-N/W heading and set their Spinnaker. We on **"Starwind"** were surprised and a little confused by their tactic, but decided it was to our advantage to carry on toward the N/E Orange Mark once we rounded the **1st Mark (White)** to port at 10:42 am, 13 min. behind **"Empire"**. At 11:14 am **"Starwind"** passed the Orange Mark & the **Race Commitee** promptly asked us to pick up the Mark.

What we didn't know aboard **"Starwind"** was that the **Race Commitee** had made a VHF Radio announcement (which none of our crew had heard), in which there would only be two legs for this race, despite the fact that the day before three marks were set out. BIG lesson learned today.
